Council of Muslim and Jewish Physicans

On Thursday 21st November the Foundation officially launched its ground breaking new forum, the Council of Muslim and Jewish Physicians. Unique Interfaith Card for the Diamond Jubilee

To celebrate the Queen's diamond Jubilee, the Foundation initiated the project "Interfaith Card for the Jubilee". 60 Muslim, Jewish and Christian children aged 11-12, each one representing one year of the Queen's reign, worked together in mixed faith groups to create a unique Jubilee congratulation card for the Queen. The card was received on behalf of Her Majesty at St James's Palace



Annual University Seminars

JIF initiated these seminars, which we organise in association with The Islamic and Jewish Societies. We are committed to freedom of expression and individual's right to privacy. We believe that "interfaith" should not necessarily only apply to the sharing of the lowest common denominator

- Over 250 Jewish and Muslim students attended our university seminars in 2012/13
- Over 90% stated that the seminars positively challenged their opinion on the topic discussed and asked the Foundation to continue organising the annual seminars
